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Introduction

Starting your studies at a new university is an important milestone, bringing with it many new discoveries, as well as practical steps to take and a new environment to become familiar with. This guide has been designed to support you as you settle in and throughout your student life at La Rochelle Université.

Here you will find all the essential information you need to prepare for the start of the academic year, understand how the University works and discover the services available to you: administrative procedures, accommodation, healthcare, dining, transport, support services, student associations, cultural and sporting

activities, as well as practical advice to help you make the most of living and studying in La Rochelle.

Whether you are joining us from the local area, another part of France, elsewhere in Europe or anywhere in the world, our aim is to make your arrival and integration as smooth as possible, so that you can fully enjoy your academic journey and student life in La Rochelle.

We hope this guide will help you quickly find your bearings and begin this new academic year in the best possible conditions.



1 Settling in France



Are you moving to La Rochelle for your exchange programme, already in France or still abroad? To help you prepare for your stay, here are a few key steps to follow so that you can settle in serenely.



Administrative situation: visa and/or residence permit

To stay and work in France, you need a visa or residence permit that fits your situation.

If you do not live in France, you must apply for a visa from the French consulate in your country of residence. In all cases, remember to prepare the following documents. You will need them for various administrative formalities in France.

If you already live in France, you must apply for a residence permit at the prefecture. You can apply directly by making an appointment at the prefecture of your place of residence or via the platform for foreign nationals in France:

Documents to bring with you:

- ✓ Copy of your **highest degree**
- ✓ Copy of your **birth certificate** (and those of your spouse and children if they travel with you)
- ✓ Copy of your **marriage certificate** (if applicable)
- ✓ Copy of your **last tax assessment** or **proof of your most recent tax return** (if you have one)
- ✓ Your **driving licence** (if you want to drive in France)
- ✓ Your **health record** and any documents relating to your medical information (and those of your spouse and children if they travel with you)
- ✓ Your child(ren)'s **school reports** if they travel with you

All these documents must be translated into French by a sworn translator.

➤ Whether you are applying for a visa or a residence permit, here are the different situations that may apply to you:



Case n°1

I am a **European citizen**

→ I don't need a visa or a residence permit



Case n°2

I am a **non-European foreigner**. I do not have an **employment contract** and I have a **grant of less than 1848€/month**.

→ I must apply for a **Student visa** or **residence permit**.



Case n°3

I am a **non-European foreigner**. I have an **employment contract** or I have a **grant worth more than 1848€/month**.

→ I must apply for a **Talent researcher visa** or **residence permit**.



Case n°4

If I am an **Algerian** :

→ I must apply for a **Scientist researcher visa** or **residence certificate**.



You can find a list of all the required documents when applying for a visa or residence permit here: [assistant visa - France-Visas](#) (visa application) or [titres, cartes de séjour et documents de circulation pour étranger en France | Service-Public.fr](#) (residence permit application).

Depending on the duration of your stay, you can apply for different types of visa :

→ **Short stay visa (Visa C)** : I am coming for a **less than 3 months** stay.

→ **Long stay visa as residence permit (VLS-TS)**: I am coming for a **stay between 3 to 12 months**. I must confirm my visa online on the ANEF platform **within three months of my arrival** in France.

→ **Long stay visa with a residence permit to apply for (Visa D)**: I am coming for a stay longer than 12 months. I must apply for a residence permit on the ANEF platform **within three months of my arrival** in France.

Check the validity of your passport (and that of your spouse and children, if they travel with you) If your passport expires within the year, we suggest you renew it before arriving in France.

French rental requirements



Inventory of fixtures

An inventory of fixtures must be carried out before you move in and before you move out.

Rent

Rent is paid monthly*.

* RENT (excluding utilities) + RENTAL CHARGES (household waste collection, maintenance of communal areas...) + UTILITIES (water, electricity, gas)

Notice

Leaving your home soon? Remember to give **your notice one month** (for furnished accommodation) or **three months** (for unfurnished accommodation) before you leave.

Security deposit

The **security deposit** (one month's rent for unfurnished accommodation, two months' rent for furnished accommodation) must be paid on arrival. It will be returned on departure if there has been no damage to the accommodation.

If you have trouble getting the deposit paid, find out about the [Loca-Pass from Action Logement](#).

Good to know :

As La Rochelle is located in a **densely populated area**, this means you can **reduce your notice period to one month**, as long as you state so in your notice letter, referring to the legislation in force: *Law n°89-462 (article 15)* and *decree n°2013-392 relating to the scope of the annual tax on vacant accommodation introduced by article 232 of the Code Général des Impôts*.

Furnished rentals

Definition

Furnished accommodation is decent accommodation equipped with furniture of sufficient quantity and quality.

Tourist accommodation

Maximum 90 days for the same tenant

Mandatory elements

The accommodation must contain a **certain amount of furniture**.

The lease

Minimum duration of 1 year.
Minimum term of 9 months for a student lease.

Security deposit

The maximum amount is **2 months' rent** excluding charges.

The notice

The tenant must give **1 month's notice** before moving out.

The rent

The rent for a furnished rental is higher than that for an unfurnished rental.

CAUTION

When you are told that rent is **'charges included'**, this often refers only to **rental charges**. **Special case:** in university residences, rent includes **private charges**.

➤ Have you found the home of your dreams? Before you move in, you will need to provide a few documents.

Documents required when submitting your rental application :

- ✓ **Proof of identity** (identity card or passport)
- ✓ **Proof of residence** (visa or residence permit)
- ✓ **Proof of income:** latest payslip, scholarship certificate, capital, tax assessment, employment contract or employer's certificate specifying the job and remuneration offered, as well as the start date and duration of the contract
- ✓ **Proof of professional status:** employment contract, employer's certificate, student card or **certificate of enrolment** for the current year, if applicable

- ✓ **A third-party guarantor:** a family member, friend, colleague or legal entity who undertakes to pay in your place if you fail to pay the rent or utilities. Your guarantor will have to provide the same supporting documents as you, and must live in France.

■ **If you are under 30**, you can apply for the **Visale guarantee**. This Action Logement service can provide you with a guarantee free of charge.

■ **If you are over 30**, you can apply for a private guarantor (for a fee).

Once your application has been accepted, you will sign a **lease** (rental contract). This is when you pay the first month's rent, the deposit and any agency fees. You should also take out house insurance.

House insurance is mandatory and will cover your expenses in the event of water damage, theft or fire

Housing benefit

The **Caisse d'Allocations Familiales (CAF)** can provide you with monthly financial assistance to pay part of your rent. Run **simulation online** and check your eligibility.

Please note :

In order to be eligible, you must have a valid residence permit. If you have a visa with the words "**dispense temporaire de carte de séjour**", you will not be entitled to housing benefit from the CAF.

Leaving your accommodation

Is it time to move out? Don't forget certain formalities...

Is it time to move out? Don't forget certain formalities...

- ✓ **Terminate the lease** by sending a registered letter with acknowledgement of receipt to your landlord (don't forget to give notice!)
- ✓ Arrange for an **inventory of fixtures on departure** (and clean the accommodation!)
- ✓ **Terminate** water/electricity/gas/insurance/ internet contracts – 15 days before your departure.



Health in France

In France, you are covered by a free, mandatory health insurance scheme called **Sécurité Sociale**. There are several ways to register for national health insurance:

Case n°1

I have a **Student visa/ residence permit**

→ I am registering on the Ameli platform via the following link: **International Students | CNAM**

Case n°2

I have a **"Talent researcher" visa/ residence permit**

→ I have an **employment contract** : The Human Resources department will arrange for me to be registered with the **CPAM** for Social Security.

Cas n°3

I have a **"Talent researcher" visa/ residence permit**

→ I **don't have an employment contract**: I am taking the necessary steps to register with the **CPAM** in my place of residence.

Case n°4

I have a **Scientist researcher permit**

→ I register to the **CPAM** of my place of residence

Please note :

If you do not have an employment contract, you can apply for coverage under the **Protection Universelle Maladie (PUMA) program after three months of stable residence**.
For the first three months of your stay, you must purchase private health insurance..

Once you have received your personal Sécurité Sociale number, you will need to create an account on the Ameli platform, which will enable you to manage all your Sécurité Sociale formalities : **créer votre compte ameli | ameli.fr | Assuré**

Social security only reimburses around 70% of medical costs. You must pay the remaining 30%. If you would like better health insurance cover for the remaining 30%, you can take out a private insurance policy called a **mutuelle**.

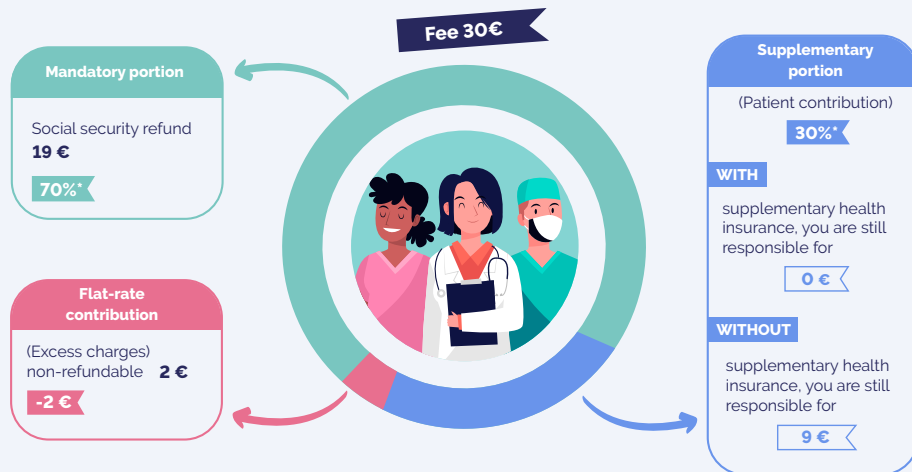
Good to know :

If I am European, I remember to request my **"carte européenne d'assurance maladie"** (CEAM) for short stays.

→ **If you have a work contract**, I take steps to register with the **MGEN** health insurance provider in my place of residence

Opening a bank account and paying taxes

Opening a bank account

To have a **French RIB** (bank account details), you will need to open a bank account in France. This RIB will be required for a number of administrative formalities, as well as by your employer if you have an employment contract.

You are free to open a bank account with the bank of your choice or online. Banks also offer various types of **insurance**, such as home insurance, which we mentioned in the accommodation section.

Documents required to open a bank account in France

- ☒ A copy of **your proof of identity**
- ☒ **Proof of address** (water, gas or electricity bill, home insurance or rent receipt, tax assessment, copy of rental contract)



Paying taxes in France

If you live in France for more than **183 days**, you are considered to be a French resident for tax purposes. You will have to declare your income once a year when you file your tax return, which takes place between **April and June**.

Please note: tax returns are based on income earned in the previous year. For example, the 2026 tax return is based solely on income earned during 2025. Tax returns are mandatory. You must file a return even if you have not earned any income.

Mobile phone deals

➤ A few tips for choosing a mobile phone package in France :

Choose a **package without commitment period** (so that you can cancel it easily when you leave the country)

Find out more about **eSIMs** or go to a shop with your debit card and proof of identity to get a standard SIM.

Emergency numbers



During your stay in La Rochelle and in France, it is useful to know the main national emergency numbers. **These services are available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, and enable you to get help quickly in an emergency, such as an accident, a medical problem, a fire or any other dangerous situation.**

Certain services are also dedicated to listening to, supporting and assisting people facing difficult situations. In particular, they can provide **help in cases of violence against women, psychological distress, suicide risk, or simply when you feel the need to talk and be referred to appropriate support services.**

Most operators can, if necessary, transfer calls to an English-speaking member of staff. The numbers below are free to call from a landline or mobile phone.

We recommend that you save them in your phone so that you can access them quickly if needed..

* In France, the **Emergency Medical Assistance Service (SAMU)** is a hospital service that coordinates the treatment of emergencies outside the hospital (on the street, at home, etc.).



Coming to La Rochelle



By train

La Rochelle-Ville railway station: this is the terminus of the **TGV INOUI** and **OUIGO Grande Vitesse** from **Paris-Montparnasse**, and is La Rochelle original station.

Many **INTERCITÉS** et **TER** trains also arrive at this station. Various bus routes provide easy access to the city centre.



La Rochelle-Porte-Dauphine station is served by a number of **TER Nouvelle-Aquitaine**, en lien avec Angoulême, Bordeaux ou encore Saintes.

Good to know :

Are you under 27 and want to travel by train? With the **carte Avantage Jeune** you can save 30% on your travel expenses all year round!



By plane

La Rochelle - Ile de Ré Airport

Located just a few kilometres from La Rochelle city centre, the airport offers **direct flights to 12 European destinations**, including London, Dublin and Porto.

When you arrive at the airport, you can take the bus to Place de Verdun. Buses run from Monday to Sunday, **departing every 10-15 minutes**.

Bordeaux (BOD) - Mérignac Airport

→ From Bordeaux airport, take a bus to Bordeaux Saint-Jean, in Hall B, Gate 7. The "30'Direct" bus takes you directly to the station. Tickets cost between €7 and €8. Buses run every day of the year, departing every 30 minutes. For more information: <https://30direct.com/en/>

→ Once you arrive at the station, you need to catch a train to La Rochelle station. You can book your ticket on the SNCF website [here](#).

→ If you arrive **from Nantes** or **Paris**, you need to go to the SNCF station (Gare de Nantes or Gare Montparnasse) and take a train to the Gare de La Rochelle. More information on the SNCF website.

Good to know :

The SNCF is the national company that manages the entire railway network in France.



Getting to and from La Rochelle

The essential tools for getting around La Rochelle:



→ **Yélo.fr :**

to discover the transport offer by bus, bike, TER, car and fares for those under 26.



→ **Modalis :**

to check your travel options by different modes of transport.

Schemes to promote sustainable mobility

La Rochelle Université has a number of schemes in place to promote the use of eco-friendly means of transport among its employees:

→ **Covering up to 75 % of transport costs** for home-to-work journeys (TER season tickets, bus passes, Yélo bike hire, etc.)

→ **Sustainable mobility package:** up to €300/year for home-to-work journeys by bike, car-sharing, scooter, shared vehicle and public transport (application to be made at the end of the calendar year)



Getting around by bike

Yélo's self-service bikes are located throughout La Rochelle and the surrounding area, making it quick and easy to get from one place to another.



How does it work?

1

Subscription: download the **Freebike 2.00** application, available on **iPhone** and **Android**, create your account and select the option you want.



2

Once you have subscribed, you can collect your bike in three different ways:

→ Use the **Freebike** app by Yélo, and scan the QR code of the bike you want;

→ Log in at the station using your username and PIN;

→ If you have a Yélo card, place it on the terminal on the right of the screen.

3

Returning the bike:

Once you have completed your journey, return the bike to a station.



Good to know : Before choosing a bike, check availability in real time using **the Yélo app** (available on iPhone and Android).

How much does it cost?



Classic bikes

- Occasional bike hire: **€1 for the first 30 minutes**. After that, you will be charged **€1.50 per additional half-hour**.
- Annual subscription: **€50 (€20 for holders of an annual Yélo bus subscription)**. You are then billed according to the time you use the bike: **the first 30 minutes are free**, then **rental costs rise to €1 per additional half-hour**.

Long-term bike hire

for €50 a year, Yélo offers you a bike with maintenance included.



Electric bikes

- Occasional bike hire: **€1.50 for the first 30 minutes**. After that, you will be charged **€2 per additional half-hour**.
- Annual subscription: **€50 (€20 for holders of an annual Yélo bus subscription which can only be bought at the Maison de la Mobilité)**. You are then billed according to the time you use the bike: **€1.50 per half-hour from the first minute**.



Getting around by bus

The Yélo bus network enables you to get around the 28 towns of La Rochelle's Conurbation Authority.

→ To travel legally, you need a valid Yélo ticket. Your **valid ticket** entitles you to travel for one hour, including transfers on all lines on the Yélo network.

→ If you don't have a ticket, **you can buy a single ticket** with your contactless card by touching the card reader, or in cash from the driver.

Good to know :

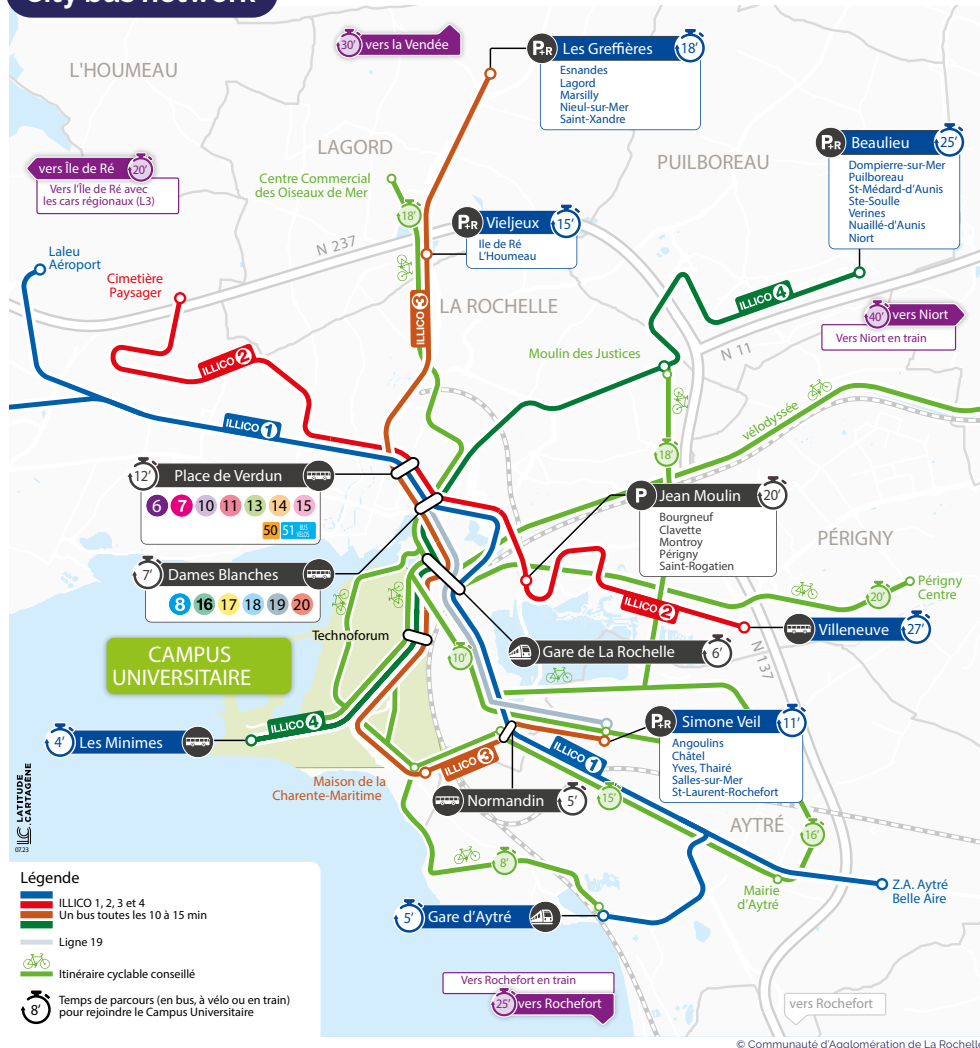
Illico lines 3 and 4 cross the campus with regular frequency (**about every 10 minutes**).

→ **Voir la carte >**

You can also purchase a ticket (**for 1 or 10 trips**) from the **Yélo mobile app** or at one of the **sales points** located throughout the metropolitan area.

As the bus approaches, **signal the driver** to stop. Enter through the front door and remember to **touch in on the card reader** each time you board the bus and each time you make a connection.

Getting around by train

As the station is close to the campus, **you can get to the university by TER.**

Two lines La Rochelle :

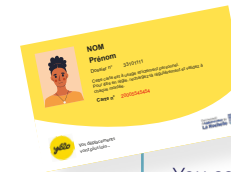
→ L14 Poitiers-La Rochelle

(Niort, Surgères, Aigrefeuille, La Jarrie...)

→ L15 Bordeaux-La Rochelle / Rochefort-La Rochelle

(Saintes, St Laurent de la Prée, Chatellailon, Angoulins, Aytré...)

Good to know : TER journeys between stations in the conurbation are included in your **Yélo season ticket** or **single ticket**.



single Yélo card for all transport!

A single card for all the transport services provided by the **Yélo network: credit and top-up passes.**

You can use it to take **buses, bikes, boats and self-service electric vehicles**, and to get to the city centre from the park-and-ride facilities using **electric shuttles**.

To get your card, go to the Maison de la Mobilité (Place de Verdun) : Monday to Friday from 7:30am to 7pm and Saturday from 8am to 6:30pm.

Getting around by car

To make it easier for you to get around, Yélo has 55 cars available for hire, with or without a reservation, from Yélobile near you, or simply by geolocating a car nearby.

Go out and come back whenever you want with **Yélo la nuit** ! Yélo by night operates by reservation on Thursdays, Fridays, Saturdays and the eve of public holidays from 9pm to 6am in all 28 towns of the La Rochelle conurbation. Museums and aquarium

If you have an appetite for culture, La Rochelle is the place for you. The city boasts many museums and spaces dedicated to art and history. Here are a few must-sees:

Aquarium La Rochelle

With over 12 000 marine animals and 82 ecosystems, La Rochelle Aquarium is one of Europe's largest private aquariums. The aquarium helps to fund a wide range of scientific research projects, and is active in raising public awareness of the need to preserve biodiversity.



Musée du Nouveau Monde

Housed in a magnificent 18th century town house, this museum invites you to discover the history of relations between La Rochelle and the Americas. Works of art, ethnographic objects and period documents are on display.



Musée maritime

museum in the harbour to discover the maritime history of La Rochelle and board historic ships such as the weather frigate France 1.



Bunker de La Rochelle

The La Rochelle bunker, built in 1941, was a place of power during the occupation. Now open to the public, it tells the story of daily life during the Second World War.



Good to know :

The city also offers a range of themed museums with specialised collections, such as **the Fine Arts Museum** and **the Natural History Museum**.

Everyday life

Markets

At the market, you'll find plenty of stalls and traders selling their products directly to you. You'll find fruit, vegetables, meat, fish, cheeses, yoghurts and much more. There are several markets in La Rochelle.

City centre

- **Central market in La Rochelle** (covered food market): open every morning all year round until 1.30pm.
- **Street market around the covered market** (food and other, with priority given to food on Saturdays): Wednesday and Saturday mornings from 7am to 1.30pm.
- **Place de Verdun, rue Gargoulleau and Place du marché** (food only): Every Friday afternoon from 1.30pm to 7.30pm.
- **Flea Market, Place de la Motte Rouge and rue Saint-Nicolas** (for professional sellers only): Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays from 8.30am to 7pm.



Supermarkets

You can also do your shopping in supermarkets, where you'll find not only food products but also household products, hygiene products and so on.



Good to know :

Opening hours are indicated in each supermarket, generally **from 8.30 am to 7.30 pm**. Some supermarkets may be closed on Sundays and public holidays.

Anti-waste solutions

To avoid throwing away edible food products, there are options for "saving" products with a short use-by date. They are also a cost-effective way of doing your shopping.

Too good to go & Phenix

- Two apps that fight food waste by putting citizens and sellers in touch with each other. Every day, you can find baskets of products at bargain prices, to be collected from one of the partner sellers (e.g., bakers, Asian caterers, restaurant owners, etc.).

Short-date products - Supermarkets

- Don't forget to look out for supermarkets that have "short-life products" trays or labels showing a discount on products that are close to their expiry date.



Sorting your waste

As part of the utilities you pay, you have to pay a tax on your household waste, which is used to fund the sorting and removal of household waste. There are four types of household waste: recyclable, non-recyclable, glass and compostable

There are two types of bins in your accommodation: **yellow** and **grey**.

- **The yellow bin** is for all your recyclable waste: plastic, cardboard and metal packaging.
- **The grey** is for all the waste you cannot sort.
- For your glass waste, **dedicated containers** are available and self-service. You can find the collection points [here](#).

YELLOW BIN

All cardboard, plastic, metal, and paper packaging should be placed in your yellow bin..



GREEN BIN

Bottles, jars, pots... all glass packaging is fully recyclable. They must be taken to one of the glass collection points located throughout the Municipal Area, or to the recycling center.

✓ Empty well without rinsing

✗ Glass, mirrors and dishes should be taken to the waste disposal center

What to do with caps lids ?

- **Metal lids and caps:**
in the yellow bin or bag
- **Synthetic wine bottle corks:**
in the blue/grey bin or black bag
- **Cork stoppers:**
drop them off at the recycling center or in the **association Echo-Mer** collection bins.
